Currently, she chairs the Kentucky/Tennessee Society of American Foresters, South Tennessee Section, and serves as a Tree Farm Inspector while also contributing as a board member and forester for the Chattanooga Audubon Society. Robinhood in the Southeast: The Untapped Potential of Parasitic Plants in Grassland Conservation | Jordan Argrett | 11:15 - 12:15

Jordan will be providing a history of our understanding of parasitic plant ecology, its impacts on complex ecological systems, and the important role that parasitic plants may play in the restoration of the historic southeastern prairies.

Jordan is passionate about understanding the interactions between plants, microbes, and their shared environment. As a graduate student at the University of Georgia, Jordan studies how parasitic plants influence plant competitive dynamics, litter decomposition, and soil microbial community structure in the Colorado Rockies. While his research is based out west, Jordan is keenly interested in understanding the impact of parasitic plants in the Southeast, especially in regard to their potential for use in grassland restoration.

Warner Park Bioretention Gardens: Native Plantings as a Tool for Outreach and Stormwater Management | Lyn Rutherford | 3:30 - 4:30

It may surprise you to learn there is a native plant oasis in the middle of a large parking lot for the Zoo and Fitness Center! But stormwater managers would tell you this is a great way to reduce flooding and urban water pollution through green infrastructure. And as a high visibility community hub and tourist destination, this is also the perfect place to do native plant and environmental outreach. Come learn about some of the City's recent educational initiatives including projects with UTC and the Zoo. Let's take a walk around the Warner Park bioretention gardens and see what's growing.

Lyn Rutherford studied Biology at Warren Wilson College. She has done trail work, conservation and habitat restoration, invasive plant management, fine gardening, and, most recently, stormwater management through green infrastructure plantings. Lyn's work for the City of Chattanooga as a Natural Resources Supervisor has given her particular expertise in the intersection of native plants and stormwater management in urban watersheds. Through her service to the City's Public Works and Parks departments, and volunteering with the Tennessee Valley Wild Ones, she has been an advocate, educator, and hands-in-the-dirt worker for native plants on public lands.
